ARTS & CULTURE SECTOR'S PERCENTAGE OF U.S. ECONOMY (Artists, University Arts, Commercial & Nonprofit Arts Organizations Combined)

ARTS & CULTURE SECTOR REPRESENTS 4.2% OF NATION'S GDP & 4.6 MILLION JOBS

U.S. Bureau of Economic Analysis reports that nationally the arts and culture sector was a **\$876.7 billion industry** in **2020**, representing **4.2%** of the nation's GDP, **4.6 million jobs**, and total compensation of **\$446 billion**.

WYOMING ARTS & CULTURE SECTOR REPRESENTS 2.9% OF STATE'S GDP & 10,670 JOBS

U.S. Bureau of Economic Analysis reports that the arts and culture sector contributed **\$1 billion** to Wyoming's economy in 2020, representing **2.9%** of the state's GDP, **10,670 jobs**, and total compensation of **\$795 million**.

LOSS OF REVENUE AND JOBS (Commercial & Nonprofit Arts Organizations Combined)

Between **2019** and **2020**, the U.S. **arts economy** shrank at **nearly twice the rate** of the economy as a whole. Arts and cultural production fell by **6.4%** when adjusted for inflation, compared with a **3.4%** decline overall.

\$53.6B GDP LOST & 600,000 JOBS LOST Wyoming arts and culture value added decreased by **7%** between 2019 and 2020. In addition, arts & culture employment decreased by **8%**, dropping from **11.577** to **10.670**.

ECONOMIC IMPACT OF NONPROFIT ARTS ORGANIZATIONS & THEIR AUDIENCES

Nationally, the nonprofit arts industry alone generates **\$166.3 billion in economic activity** annually that supports **4.6 million jobs** and generates **\$27.5 billion** in federal, state, and local government revenue.

• Spending by arts audiences generated **\$102.5 billion** to local businesses.

NONPROFIT **ART** IS A \$166.3

DRIVER OF OUR NATIONAL, STATE & LOCAL ECONOMY.

In 2015, Wyoming's arts and culture sector employed **thousands of FTE jobs** and generated **millions of dollars in economic activity**. Nonprofit arts groups helped cultivate that activity.

 In the Town of Jackson, for example, nonprofit arts groups generated \$18.7 million in economic activity. Audiences of 597,580 people added another \$32.5 million in related spending for a total of \$51.2 million for the city in 2015, and this generated \$5.1 million in local and state government revenues and 1,058 FTE jobs.

PUBLIC INVESTMENT IN GRANTS TO NONPROFIT ARTS ORGANIZATIONS & ARTISTS

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How much is the federal government investing in the National Endowment for the Arts (NEA)?

Congress allocated **\$180 million** to the NEA in **FY22**. This amounts to just **54 cents** per capita. Ideally, Congress should index \$1 per capita funding to the NEA. For COVID economic relief, Congress also allocated **\$75 million** in CARES Act and **\$135 million** in ARPA funding for distribution by the NEA. Additionally, Congress allocated **\$16 billion** to the SBA for shuttered arts venues plus billions more for PPP and EIDL.

How much did Wyoming receive in public funding for the arts and culture?

In FY21-22, the state allocated \$929,217 to the Wyoming Arts Council. The Wyoming Arts Council also received \$743,483 in federal NEA funds, \$420,100 through CARES, \$746,700 through ARPA, and \$2,400,000 from the state for COVID relief. Approximately 978,220 adults, 334,842 youth, and 18,755 artists benefitted from these funding sources. Another 10 nonprofit arts organizations received direct grants from the NEA totaling \$545,000.
