ARTS & CULTURE SECTOR'S PERCENTAGE OF U.S. ECONOMY (Artists, University Arts, Commercial & Nonprofit Arts Organizations Combined)

ARTS & CULTURE SECTOR REPRESENTS 4.2% OF NATION'S GDP & 4.6 MILLION JOBS

U.S. Bureau of Economic Analysis reports that nationally the arts and culture sector was a \$876.7 billion industry in 2020, representing 4.2% of the nation's GDP, **4.6 million jobs**, and total compensation of **\$446 billion**.

MD ARTS & CULTURE SECTOR REPRESENTS 2.5% OF STATE'S GDP & 68,265 JOBS

U.S. Bureau of Economic Analysis reports that the arts and culture sector contributed **\$10.2 billion** to MD's economy in 2020, representing **2.5%** of the state's GDP, **68,265 jobs**, and total compensation of **\$6.1 billion**.

BONUS: In 2020, MD arts and culture ranked 3rd among the comparison sectors.

LOSS OF REVENUE AND JOBS (Commercial & Nonprofit Arts Organizations Combined)

Between 2019 and 2020, the U.S. arts economy shrank at nearly twice **the rate** of the economy as a whole. Arts and cultural production fell by **6.4%** when adjusted for inflation, compared with a **3.4%** decline overall.

Maryland arts and culture value added decreased by 8% between 2019 and 2020. In addition, arts & culture employment decreased by **14%**, dropping from 79.866 to 68.265.

ECONOMIC IMPACT OF NONPROFIT ARTS ORGANIZATIONS & THEIR AUDIENCES

Nationally, the nonprofit arts industry alone generates **\$166.3 billion in** economic activity annually that supports 4.6 million jobs and generates **\$27.5** billion in federal, state, and local government revenue.

• Spending by arts audiences generated **\$102.5 billion** to local businesses.

NONPROFIT **ART** IS A

BILLION

DRIVER OF OUR NATIONAL, **STATE & LOCAL ECONOMY.**

In 2015, nonprofit arts organizations in the state generated **\$961.6 million** in economic activity annually that supported 25,248 jobs and generated **\$87.4 million** in state and local government revenue.

• In **Baltimore** specifically, nonprofit arts groups generated **\$326.3 million** in economic activity. Audiences of 54.5 million people added another **\$279.7 million** in related spending for a total of **\$606.1 million** for the city in 2015, and this generated **\$54.5 million** in local and state government revenues.

PUBLIC INVESTMENT IN GRANTS TO NONPROFIT ARTS ORGANIZATIONS & ARTISTS

How much is the federal government investing in the National Endowment for the Arts (NEA)?


Congress allocated **\$180 million** to the NEA in **FY22**. This amounts to just **54 cents** per capita. Ideally, Congress should index \$1 per capita funding to the NEA. For COVID economic relief, Congress also allocated **\$75 million** in CARES Act and **\$135 million** in ARPA funding for distribution by the NEA. Additionally, Congress allocated **\$16 billion** to the SBA for shuttered arts venues plus billions more for PPP and EIDL.

How much did Maryland receive in public funding for the arts and culture?

In **FY21-22**, the state allocated **\$26,333540** to the Maryland State Arts Council. The Maryland State Arts Council also received **\$819,900** in federal NEA funds, which the Council re-granted to dozens of cultural organizations throughout the state. Another **36** nonprofit arts organizations received direct grants from the NEA totaling \$2,584,000.

- An annual must-do in **Baltimore** is Artscape, the largest free arts festival in the country, featuring hundreds of artists and attracting over 350,000 people each year
- With tons of working artists and charm to spare, it's easy to see why **Berlin** on Maryland's Eastern Shore is known as America's Coolest Small Town.
- An artist's haven in the Appalachians, Spruce Forest Artisan Village in **Grantsville** will take you back in time and fill you with inspiration.
- A sculpture made entirely of marshmallow PEEPs? Entries from the annual PEEP Show at the Carroll Art Center in **Westminster** are museum-worthy, and the annual event is a major revenue stream for the local arts council.

- Wander with wonder at Anne Marie Sculpture Garden, a thirty-acre public park in **Solomons** where art and nature meet.
- Occupying a former amusement park, **Glen Echo** Park offers hundreds of classes, workshops and performances each year that attract over 400,000 visitors.
- **Salisbury** is the home of the National Folk Festival 2018 - 2020, welcoming artists from across the country and highlighting the traditions that have taken root in Maryland.
- Walk the halls of a gallery displaying the work of local African-American artists, listen to historic and

- contemporary music, and dive deep into African-American history and culture at the Howard County Center of African American Culture in **Columbia**.
- Out west in **Cumberland**, enjoy the annual DelFest – a bluegrass and folk music festival, perfectly situated along the Potomac River in the Appalachian Mountains at the Allegany County Fairgrounds.
