THE ARTS ARE EVERYWHERE

North Alabama

- Huntsville is a booming city for technological arts experiences, including Lowe Mill, the Orion Amphitheater, Merrimack Hall Performing Arts Center, and Huntsville Community Drumline.
- Florence and The Shoals have the Swampers, a group of studio musicians that have been associated with more than 500 recordings, including 74 gold and platinum hits. Visit Muscle Shoals Sound Studio and the Alabama Music Hall of Fame to learn more about this group. Florence is also home to Kennedy Douglass Art Center and Shoals Symphony Orchestra.

Central Alabama

 Head down to Birmingham for art experiences at Birmingham Museum of Art, Red MountainTheatre, Nathifa Dance Company, Opera Birmingham, Sidewalk Film Center and Cinema, and Alabama Symphony Orchestra.

Central Alabama (continued)

- The state's capital, Montgomery, is home to many organizations that blend the importance of the Civil Rights Movement with the beauty of art, such as the Equal Justice Initiative and Troy University's Rosa Parks Museum. While in town, drive over to Blount Cultural Park to visit Alabama Shakespeare Festival and Montgomery Museum of Fine Arts.
- Tuscaloosa offers a variety of collegiate and community arts orgs, such as The University of Alabama's Paul R. Jones Museum, Theatre Tuscaloosa, and Alabama Blues Project.
- In Shelby County, visit Klein Arts & Culture in Harpersville to engage in activities that raise consciousness about race through dance, music, poetry, visual arts, and education, or check out the latest exhibit at the Shelby County Arts Council's EBSCO Fine Art Gallery.

South Alabama

- In Camden, you can spend some time at Black Belt Treasures Cultural Arts Center, then catch the ferry over to Gee's Bend, where you can meet the famous Gee's Bend Quilters.
- Dothan, located in the heart of the Wiregrass, offers gems such as Wiregrass Museum of Art and Southeast Alabama Community Theatre.
- Enjoy the sun and gulf waters in Mobile, while finding some time to visit Mobile Museum of Art, Alabama Contemporary Art Center, Mobile Ballet, and Mobile Symphony.
