THE ARTS ARE EVERYWHERE

- For two weeks each summer, The Festival at Sandpoint, hosts back-to-back concerts featuring big name artists and local and regional musicians and groups. World-class performances are held in a beautiful outdoor venue located in the northern panhandle. 45 miles south of Sandpoint, Coeur d'Alene artists of all kinds network at Emerge CDA, which offers classes, unique events, and gallery space. Their Emerging Artist Incubator presents a robust roster of professional development workshops, panel discussions and open critiques.
- In the north central part of the state the arts are the "Main" event. On Main Street in Lewiston the Center for Arts & History connects the Lewis-Clark State College with the historic downtown district. The circa-1884 brick building houses an expansive gallery and space for artist talks and author readings. On Main Street in Moscow, the cities Arts Department celebrates the wealth of artistic practice in the Palouse-region by bringing together businesses, non-profits and artists for the Artwalk.

- The event, held the 3rd Thursday of the month October through May, features music, food, exhibits and performances.
- Arts aficionados will find the southwest region of the state bustling with exciting arts experiences, from a full-slate season of new plays at Boise Contemporary Theater, to the illustrious literature line-up at The Cabin and the Death Rattle Writers Festival, and compelling concerts presented by the Boise Phil and Opera Idaho. LED's cutting-edge modern dance, Ballet Idaho's classical ballet and the traditional Oinkari Basque Dancers all thrive in the Treasure Valley, too.
- Art appreciation is a foundational value of central Idaho towns. For over 50 years, Sun Valley Museum of Art has served as the Wood River Valley's cultural anchor, offering year-round programming in visual arts, music, film, and the humanities. The Twin Falls community collaborates with the Magic Valley Arts Council to produce Art & Soul of the Magic Valley, the nation's largest public-voting, cash-awarding art contest. Taking place in businesses and public spaces, this arts education and arts

- appreciation event welcomes artists from around the world.
- The oldest orchestra in the state of Idaho the Idaho State-Civic Symphony, established in the early 1900s, is no small potato either – the 90-member orchestra is made up of community musicians, Idaho State University students and faculty, and presents a regular schedule of concerts in an impressive 123,000 squarefoot edifice of classic design.
- Idahoan's love of arts is home-grown, and inspired by, arts education programs across the state. From an outside classroom in a state park Writers at Harriman encourages young writers. The National Oldtime Fiddlers' Contest and Festival in Weiser fine-tunes the fiddle skills of folks of all ages, and the Idaho Shakespeare Festival, through its school tours, Shakespearience and Idaho Theater for Youth, annually reaches over 50,000 Idaho kids.
